




California's WIA, Title II programs saw a significant decline in enrollment in the past two program years – 19.6 percent in the 2009–10; 14.1 percent in the 2010–11

Enrollment in the WIA, Title II program includes LEAs, Community Colleges, CBOs, COE, Library Literacy programs, COE, and Jail programs



NRS National WIA, Title II Enrollment





California served one-fifth of the nation's adults











Enrollment by Agency Size






Educational Level

California WIA, Title II Enrollment






Labor Force Status

California WIA, Title II Enrollment






Primary and Secondary Goals






2010-11 WIA, Title II NRS Performance

Performance Trend




California WIA, Title II, PY 2010-11










2010-11 Core Performance NRS Federal Table 5

1,104 students retained employment.


879 students entered postsecondary education or training.

9,390 students obtained a GED or high school diploma.




2012-13 NRS Federal Changes

- Changes to Follow-up Outcomes: Participants automatically identified based on "cohort" designation instead of selfreported goals
- Definition for "cohort" varies by outcome




2012-13 NRS Federal Changes – Employment Cohorts

- Entered Employment Cohort
 - Learners who are not employed at time of entry and in the labor force who exit during the program year.
- Retained Employment Cohort
 - Learners employed at entry who exit during the program year; and learners who were not employed at time of entry and in the labor force, who are employed by the first quarter after exit quarter.



2012-13 NRS Federal Changes – Secondary Credential Cohort

- Obtain Secondary Credential Cohort
 - Learners who take all GED tests, or are enrolled in adult high school at the high ASE level, or in the assessment phase of the NEDP, who exit during the program.
 - GED tests may be taken any time (before or after exit), but all 5 tests must be taken by the end of reporting period.



2012-13 NRS Federal Changes – Postsecondary Cohort

Postsecondary Cohort

- All learners who have earned a secondary credential while enrolled, hold a secondary credential at entry, or are enrolled in a class specifically designed for transitioning to community college, who exit during the program year.
- Report for two years, in two rows on Table 5 (unduplicated)


Transition Programs: ABE/ASE/ESL to Postsecondary Education

- 62% Counseling to explore transition options
- 49% Guest Speakers
- 40% Partnerships with local colleges
- 40% Orientation procedures




Transition Programs: ABE/ASE/ESL to Postsecondary Education

- 34% Classes designed to help transitions
- 29% College tours and other field trips
- 17% Co-Location of Adult Education and Community College classes
- 17% No Transition Programs



Transition Programs: ABE/ASE/ESL to Workforce and/or Job Training

- 55%- Counseling to explore transition options
- 50%- Curriculum to integrate Vocational Education with Adult Education
- 48% Partnerships with WIB, onestop, Chamber or other organizations
- 47% Guest Speakers



Transition Programs: ABE/ASE/ESL to Workforce and/or Job Training

- 38% Classes designed to help transitions
- 37% Orientation procedures
- 30% Offer VESL or VABE courses
- 24% Field trips
- 17% No Transition Programs
