## Synchronize your Computer Clock with an Internet Time Server

If your computer is a member of a domain, your computer clock is probably synchronized automatically by a network time server. If your computer is not a member of a domain, you can synchronize your computer clock with an Internet time server ("Synchronizing," 2012).

- 1. Click the clock in the right-hand corner at the bottom of your screen.
- 2. Click "Change date and time settings."

Windows displays the **Date and Time** dialog window.

 Click the "Internet Time" tab. (This tab isn't available if your computer is a member of a domain. Contact your network administrator.)

4. Click "Change settings."
